Letter from President, Deborah Templer

Dear Women's Habitat Supporter,

Women's Habitat was one of the first shelters for abused women in the Greater Toronto Area. At the time, the founders knew women faced untold violence – not from strangers, but from husbands and boyfriends. It took many forms. There was physical abuse such as hitting, punching, kicking, spitting and assault with a weapon. It encompassed humiliation, threats, insults, kidnapping, unlawful imprisonment, harassment and stalking. Now, as then, it is paralyzing. It is pervasive. And it's devastating for both women and children.

The shelter was opened to be a safe place for women and children. Our mission has not changed. The organization that was held together by a wish and a prayer in 1978 now receives core funding from the provincial government, the United Way and the many hundreds of private supporters who help keep the shelter going with their financial support. This year, our donors contributed \$173,725, almost 10% of our revenue, an increase of about 10% over 2012.

In the past year, on any given day, there were 10 families housed at Women's Habitat – 10 stories of violence and despair and 15 stories from children who have witnessed more than we would ever want them to. We were at 100% capacity all year. At the shelter, women find safety, solace and the support they needed to build a new life for themselves and their children. The children find out they are not alone and that they have someone to help them cope with what they've been through.

But Women's Habitat has always known there are women outside the shelter who need help. In 2002, after community consultation, we opened the Outreach Centre at 140 Islington and offered one-to-one counseling, housing, transitional and parent support, abused women's groups in English and in Spanish, art therapy, social, education and housing drop-ins, Girlz Space after-school programming, and a Community Garden and Good Food Market.

We are constantly responding to demonstrated needs in the Outreach Program and have this year, thanks to support from The Toronto Calcutta Foundation, added the Incredible Years Program, a parent group for moms with children ages 2 to 6 and the STAR Program, an interactive learning group for children ages 7 to 12.

The Outreach Centre provided services to more than 800 women and 400 children in the local community – women children and teenagers in 2012/13. Each person has her own story. Each one has a new life to live.

The 2012/2013 year also found us responding to changing needs throughout the organization. The situation of many women is increasingly complex with substance abuse issues, mental health challenges, precarious immigration status and an increasingly impenetrable justice system.

The job of Women's Habitat is to make sure every woman; every child and every youth who comes to us for help make some progress towards a new life, a life that's free from violence and full of promise. It is our common purpose.

I want to thank all our staff, volunteers, funders and donors for supporting that purpose.

LETTER FROM EXECUTIVE DIRECTOR, SILVIA SAMSA

Dear Women's Habitat Supporter,

This year, the Federal-Provincial-Territorial Ministers for the Status of Women called violence against women in Canada "a serious, pervasive problem that crosses every social boundary and affects communities across the country."

"It remains a significant barrier to women's equality and has devastating impacts on the lives of women, children, families and Canadian society as a whole," they went on to say in their report *Measuring Violence Against Women: Statistical Trends* released in February 2013. This was the first statistical report released on violence against women in Canada since 2006.



- Police-reported data show just over 173,600 women aged 15 and older were victims of violent crime in 2011. This is slightly higher than the rate of all violent crime against men.
- The actual incidence of violent acts against women and girls is estimated to be much higher than official police-reported statistics suggest, as a large percentage of this violence goes unreported.
- Both self-reported and police-reported data indicate that younger women are most at risk of violence.

For 35 years, Women's Habitat has been a refuge for women fleeing violence. In the pages of this Annual Report, you will learn how we offer shelter and the support women need in order to do what they need to build a new life for themselves and their children. You'll be able to read about the programs offered through the Outreach Office where women get help with housing, the court system and their children. You can check out the Incredible Year's Program and the STAR Program on page eight or our annual statistics on page five.

I want to thank our terrific staff who are passionate about their work, our Board of Directors who provide unwavering leadership, our volunteers who help us through each day. And, of course, our funders and our donors, who literally help keep a roof over our head and food on the table.

As an organization set up to help women who've experienced violence, we understand the women who come through our doors are the lucky ones. They will be safe and have help.

There is much work left to do. We are so glad you are by our side.

Shelter and support for women and children

Women's Habitat is an agency that supports women and their children fleeing violence. We have a 25-bed shelter where women typically stay four to six months. Last year 40 families passed through the shelter: 40 women and 75 children. At the shelter, both women and children receive counselling and support. Women's Habitat also includes the Outreach Centre where women living in the community come for a variety of support from help leaving an abusive relationship to parenting support to afterschool program for at-risk girls. All in all, 576 women, children, and youth were served through the Outreach Program 2012/2013.





SHELTER FROM THE STORM

"My two children and I have been living in the shelter for nine months and it has been an unforgettable period. The experience at Women's Habitat is more than living in a shelter. I remember being lost in a feeling of desperation and sadness when I first arrived here; but as we are leaving today, I feel happy and more confident about our future. I'm excited about moving into our new home, yet at the same time, I know I'll miss the people who we have shared many memorable moments that are like blessings from God, a gift that makes me stronger, and a light that illuminates my life."

When a woman leaves a violent situation with her children, she is stepping into a void. She is not sure where she will a land and worried about how disrupting the home life – no matter what kind of home life it is – of her children.

"The first job of Women's Habitat is to offer that woman and her children a safe place to live, a place where they will secure and have their personal needs looked after," says Shelter Manager, Julia Fiddes.

"We then supply the tools she will need to start a new life – help with housing, legal matters, childcare, employment and immigration. The list goes on. Some women have to interact with a dozen different organizations and government departments before they can move on. Shelter staff are here 24/7 to offer emotional support and counselling to help women and children understand the impact of violence on their lives and how they can overcome that. And, of course, when women have the opportunity to share with each other, it invariably helps them all feel a little stronger."

"Girlz Space is amazing," says Tisha, a regular at the program. "I love coming here. The people are great. It's like a second home!"

Reaching out to the community: Outreach program highlight

KEEPING AN EYE ON OUR GIRLS

Girlz Space @ 140 is an after-school program for girls in grades 6 to 8 who are at that awkward stage in life where they are too old for daycare, but still require a safe place to be. It's a vulnerable time, when they want more independence but still need support. Between the time school ends and dinner time is a part of the day when they don't generally have supervision -- or support. Many of the girls who come to Girlz Space are from low-income, women-led families who are survivors of violence.

The Girlz Space program aims to help girls develop the tools necessary for the healthy socialization such as cooperation, team-building, and conflict resolution.

"We also help girls improve their academic achievement through homework help and address issues pertinent to the lives of the girls, such as anti-bullying, youth justice, healthy relationships, and violence in the home," says Rosa Lopes-Iraheta, Outreach Program Manager.

"The girls come here regularly and form relationships with staff. They can discuss personal issues such as violence at home, in school, with peers and with the opposite sex. We talk about this in a group format and individually. It's almost like a second family for some. And our location

"I dont know where I'd be if I couldn't come here! In trouble, probably." provides an important access point of safety for the young women who live in south Etobicoke."

Violence against women is an under reported crime. Many women and children do not seek help immediately. Women's Habitat maintains that Girlz Space is another way to reach out for help. Many women have accessed services as a direct result of their daughters attending the Girlz Space Program. Girls leaving the program often want to come back to do their high school community service hours.



Breaking News



Women's Habitat believes that to have happy and healthy children, you need healthy and happy mothers. Part of our plan is to alleviate as much stress from the women that we work with as possible.

Over the past four years, we have been working to build support systems for mothers that allow them to be the best parents possible. This year, two new programs have been added to our Parent Support Program, thanks to the support of the Toronto Calcutta Foundation.

INCREDIBLE YEARS PROGRAM: This program for moms with children ages 2 to 6 is co-facilitated with the City of Toronto. Parents learn how to play, praise, set limits, problem-solve and deal with behavioural issues. Healthy food and childcare provided.

STAR (STRIVING TOWARDS A POSITIVE RESULT) PROGRAM: This is an interactive learning group for children ages 7 to 12 to build safe, healthy relationships, build their self-esteem, learn about bullying, make new friends and much more. Healthy food and childcare provided. From fundraising money, we send the women on trips that they could not afford to take on their own.


