Women's Habitat received an extremely generous donation of 60 backpacks this year from Backpacks 101. The backpacks were distributed to parents, teens and children who are clients of Women's Habitat. The founder of this exceptional program, Monique D'Sa has volunteered at Women's Habitat since 2006.

The concept of Backpacks 101 was created when the hectic lifestyle of raising two children left little time to volunteer outside her home,

Monique elaborates:

"I still wanted to do something for the kids at the shelter, so I sent out emails and asked for donations from friends to fill 20 backpacks for the children living in the shelter and that's how it started. I enjoyed putting them together and my kids would help out. I continued because I wanted my children to help others in their own community and realize that there are people right here at home who could use a little help and that if you are able to do something, even something small that you should take the time and energy to do so."

Monique's hope is that the project inspires young people to help, like Emma, a 7 year old girl who organized a lemonade stand to raise funds for the project. Today, over fifty-percent of her volunteers are young people.

The Need

After 35 years, our shelter has become worn with use. The sewage system needs replacement. The kitchen is not up to code. There are two bathrooms on the second floor for 25 women and children. We are not wheelchair accessible. There is a section of the basement blocked off because of mold. Updating the facilities has become a necessity. In early 2013, after exploring all options, including: meeting with the City of Toronto Planning Department, completing a home inspection, evaluating the cost of purchasing a piece of land and building a new facility (\$5 to \$7 million), Women's Habitat decided the most effective and economical course of action was to retrofit the existing building.

In March 2014 the shelter was temporarily shut down in order to complete the renovation to improve security, accessibility, programming areas, and to meet building and safety standards. The renovation is scheduled to be completed in the Spring of 2015.

The cost of the project will be just over \$2 million, plus the cost of new furnishings, appliances and maintenance.


The Result

Besides bringing the shelter up to code with new electrical, plumbing, water and sewer, heating and cooling systems, the renovation will dramatically improve the quality of life for women and children at the shelter in other ways.

- * There will be twice as many washrooms on the second floor. Two families will share one washroom.
- * The shelter will be made accessible to women and children with mobility issues.
- * There will be laundry facilities on the second floor.
- * The kitchen will be three times as big to allow women to gather and cook there.
- * The children's playroom, right next to the kitchen, will be visually accessible.
- * The Child and Youth Advocate will have a beautiful new space in the house.
- * There will be a unit for a family in which there is a disability.
- * There will be new counselling offices and a library in the basement.
- * The backyard will be useable.
- * Bedrooms will be much brighter and more pleasant.

Women's Habitat is working with Hilditch Architects, experts in designing community centres, emergency shelters, and public space to design and oversee the renovations and DASD General Contractors who also have a successful history of work in the community.





Interview with Cecilia Nunez, Outreach Counsellor

Women's Habitat has provided services in Spanish to our clients since 1992. We are here with Cecilia Nunez, Outreach counsellor who will give us a brief description of her work with the community.

What are the services provided to women at the Outreach Centre?

We offer counselling services in individual and group settings, we have drop-in services, housing and transitional support, respite care and a number of very innovative young women's programs.

Which programs do you facilitate?

I am the Spanish speaking counsellor and I have the privilege to facilitate the Women's Support Group in Spanish and provide one-on-one counselling sessions both in Spanish and English.

Why do you think it is important to offer services specifically in Spanish?

The Spanish speaking community in Toronto has been growing at a fast rate in recent years, unfortunately this means that the demand for our services has also increased. The cycle of abuse is a phenomenon very common in women's lives, including the Spanish speaking community. If you are able to receive help in your own language, you have the opportunity to understand what abuse is, break the state of isolation and build a support network.

What are some of the reasons why clients would access your services?

My clients come looking for support at very different stages. Some of them are struggling to recognize the early signs of abuse, others are trying to overcome the feeling of shame and failure caused by past relationships. Many are looking for help for themselves, but we have cases in which they are looking for services for their loved ones too.

How do you determine which is the best setting for a client to receive help?

I always start with an interview. During that first session I can determine if the client would benefit best from group or individual counselling sessions. Sometimes in addition to attending sessions at the Outreach Centre, our clients require referrals to other off-site services like legal clinics or government support services.

What are some of the desired outcomes from the groups and counselling services you facilitate?

I want my clients to be able to recognize the cycle of abuse,

increase their self-esteem, build healthy relations and learn how to build positive boundaries in their lives. Above all, my clients must know that living without violence is possible.

You are starting a new set of sessions in September; could you give us some details about it?

The Women's Support Group in Spanish has 2 sets of sessions per year with 10 weekly meetings. The upcoming fall session runs from Wednesday, September 17, 2014 to Wednesday, November 19, 2014 from 6pm-8pm. We currently have 12 women registered; childcare and a light meal will be provided.

How do you measure the success of the group sessions?

It gives me great satisfaction to have a consistently full house, where my clients can acknowledge the transformations that they're making in their lives. Additionally, participants should exhibit a strong commitment to working with difficult topics and respect the different group members' points of view. At the end of the final session, I have the participants fill out a survey that helps me evaluate the dynamics and effectiveness of the program.

Is there something you would like to add?

I feel very privileged to work with Spanish speaking women and to serve the Latin-American community. The best part of my job is the ability to stay in contact with my clients and witness their inspirational growth.

The number of families on the waiting increased by 44% since 2004.

Often women make the difficult and dangerous decision to remain in abusive situations with their partners because of the severe lack of available, safe, and affordable housing. Since 2004, the number of families on waitlists for GTA's subsidized housing have increased by 44 percent. Unable to secure affordable housing forces women and their children to remain in unsafe circumstances to avoid homelessness or possible starvation.

At Women's Habitat we are committed to helping women secure quality housing in a timely manner; securing shelter is an instrumental step in women's ability to become self-reliant and healthy. Our Housing Worker, Mahbooba Hashimi provides one-on-one housing assistance to our Outreach clients. Since 2006, the demand for Mahbooba's services has doubled – taking on an additional 175 new clients per year! She consults daily on a wide-range of matters, including: eviction prevention, landlord disputes, tenant rights and negotiating short-term leases. In addition to Mahbooba's one-on-one housing assistance, she hosts a Housing Drop-In service every third Wednesday of the month from 5:30pm-7:30pm. The program assists women in their housing search, subsidized housing applications and collecting information on Rent Bank and Tenant Rights and Responsibilities.

In the coming year, Women's Habitat will continue supporting all our committed counsellors to secure affordable housing for our clients.

Youth Philanthropy Initiative Grant Supports Innovative Outreach Programming

Women's Habitat is honoured to have been awarded a \$5,000 Youth Philanthropy Initiative (YPI) grant from the Toskan Casale Foundation. YPI was founded in Toronto in 2002. The initiative encourages students to learn about and become involved with charitable organizations in their own communities.

"YPI is a hands-on, reality-based experience through a strong academic philanthropy course which gives [students] the skills to assess the needs of their community and make grants to grassroots, community based charities meeting those needs. Our course empowers young people to authentically participate in the development of their communities, engaging them as dedicated problem solvers and volunteers."

Today, YPI has become an international movement with 195,800 participants from across Canada, Europe and the United States.

Earlier this spring our Community Relations
Co-ordinator, Ursula Krubnik met with YPI students
from Father Henry Carr Catholic Secondary School
at our Outreach Centre. After the tour of our
Outreach Centre, the YPI students prepared grouppresentations for their respective classes based on
Outreach's comprehensive services and programs.
The top groups' presentations were then selected
and invited to present at a school-wide exhibition
in front of a panel of judges. The most compelling
presentation was chosen and their charitable
organization was then awarded the grant. Women's
Habitat was the lucky recipient this year!

It is encouraging to see youth excited and involved in such positive and promising endeavours. Women's Habitat is delighted to have had the opportunity to participate in this incredible program. We couldn't be more pleased by the students' ability to describe and advocate for our services.

Outtripping with TROOPS

ProAction Cops & Kids sponsors TROOP which partners with community organizations to provide at-risk youth, 12 to 18 years old the opportunity to experience the outdoors.

Accompanying our young campers on this adventure was Munice Wright, one of our courageous Outreach counsellors. She elaborates on the trip's success:

"The trip was an extremely important opportunity. Participants were able to build self-esteem, make positive connections with officers and forge new friendships with teens from their community."

For several of these teens this was their first time canoeing and camping. This experience challenged them to try new activities and to improve their communication skills. It was an incredibly memorable experience!
